The Registrars Office is responsible for: all Births, Marriages, Re-marriages, Civil Unions, Domestic Partnerships and Deaths within the Municipality that the event occurred.

If you are planning on entering into a marriage or civil union and wish to apply for a license, Please call your local registrar to schedule an appointment. This can be done where either of you reside.

All LICENSES ARE \$28.00 (cash or check only).

Upon receiving your license, you may hold the ceremony anywhere in New Jersey. If you wish to have the ceremony outside the State of New Jersey, you would contact the local government /registrar where the event will take place.

Application for vital records may also be made at the State level. The Office of Vital Statistics and Registry registers vital events and maintains the following vital records:

- * Birth, marriage and death records starting at 1919
- * Domestic partnership records starting at 2004
- * Civil union records starting at 2007
- * Adoptions—foreign and domestic
- * Certificate of Birth Resulting in Stillbirth data starting at 1969

For information about vital records from May 1848–1918 visit the State Archives. The Archives also holds microfilm, copies of births from 1901-1923, deaths and marriages from 1901-1940. These materials are available for in-person use only. Further information visit www.state.nj.us/health/vital/index.shtml

Please note, New Jersey law protects and restricts the release of vital records. Vital records are **not public records** and can not be searched online.

How to Obtain a certified copy of a Vital Record, such as a Birth, Death, Marriage, Re-marriages, Civil Unions, or Domestic Partnerships Certificate:

In accordance with the Governor's Executive Order #18, only the following persons are entitled to a certified copy of a vital record: Subject, Subject's Parents, Legal Guardians, or Legal Representative, Spouse, Child, Grandchild or Sibling, if of legal age. An application must be fully and accurately completed when requesting a copy of a vital record from the municipal registrar.

ALL CERTIFIED COPIES ARE \$15.00 each.



This house was built in 1787 as the home of the Reverend Elias Van Bunschooten, a Dutch Reformed Minister. He was a farmer, mill operator, and large land owner. The farm was part of a 1000-acre plantation. The Dutch Colonial house is post and beam construction. Out buildings include a Wagon House, Ice House and a Privy. The home was given to the Chinkchewunska Chapter of the daughters of the American Revolution by Mr. & Mrs. Clifford Ramsey in 1971. The house and outbuildings were listed on the National Register of Historic Sites and Places in 1974.



Get the Bear Facts

REMEMBER: Never feed bears!! It's illegal in New Jersey, and it's dangerous.



DID YOU KNOW?

- Black bears are usually solitary animals that are most active at dawn and dusk.
- Black bears have excellent senses of smell and hearing.
- Black bears can run up to 35 miles per hour. They are strong
- swimmers and excellent climbers. Both adults and cubs will climb trees for food and to escape disturbances.
- Black bears eat both plants and animals. Their diet mostly consists of skunk cabbage, berries, wild cherries, acorns and beechnuts. They also eat insects, small mammals and dead animals.
- Black bears are opportunistic feeders and will supplement their diet with food or garbage left out by people.
- ♦ Adult females average 175 pounds; adult males average 400 pounds.
- Not all black bears are black. They can be brown, cinnamon, blonde white and even gray-blue. Fifteen percent of NJ's bears have a white chest blaze.
- During winter, black bears undergo a period of dormancy in dens, called torpor, to avoid severe weather and food shortages. Since black bears are not true hibernators, they may leave their dens if disturbed or to search for food on mild winter days.
- Den sites include rock cavities, brush piles, open ground nests and hollow trees. Bears do not eat, drink, urinate or defecate while in dens, but females can give birth and nurse their young.
- Breeding season runs from late May until August, peaking in June and July. Cubs are born in January and weigh about 8 ounces to 16 ounces. The average litter size is three. Cubs remain with the
- female until she breeds again 16 months to 18 months later.



TIPS FOR HOMEOWNERS

- ◆ Use certified bear-resistant garbage containers if you live in an area frequented by black bears. They offer the best protection. Otherwise, store all garbage in containers with tight-fitting lids and place them along the inside walls of your garage or in the basement, a sturdy shed or other secure area.
- Wash garbage containers with a disinfectant solution regularly to remove odors.
- Put out garbage on collection day, not the night before.
- ◆ Clean up after pets. If you feed them outside, do so during daylight hours only. Pick up any leftover food and remove bowls
- immediately after they have finished.
- Clean outdoor grills and utensils thoroughly after each use and store grills securely. Grease and food residue attract bears.
- Do not place meat or any sweet foods in compost piles.
- ♦ Avoid feeding birds if you live in an area frequented by black bears. Birdseed attracts bears. If you choose to feed birds, do so during daylight hours only between December 1 and April 1, when bears are least active. Suspend feeder from a free-hanging wire, making sure the bottom is at least 10 feet off the ground. Bring feeder indoors at night. Clean up spilled seeds and shells.
- Pick up any fruit or nuts that fall from trees and discard it in garbage containers with tight-fitting lids.
- Consider installing electric fencing to protect crops, beehives, livestock and compost piles if you live in an area frequented by black bears.

REMEMBER: Immediately notify local police or the DEP'S Division of Fish and Wildlife at 1(877)WARN DEP if you encounter an AGGRESSIVE BEAR.

Outdoor Lighting Safety

- Check all lights for frayed wires or areas where insulation has pulled away from plugs or sockets. Dis- card and replace any damaged light strings.
- Take extra care using a ladder to install lights-avoid contact with overhead wires and make sure the ladder is placed on solid, level ground that isn't slippery.
- Ensure that tacks or nails used to hold light strings do not pierce any insulation on wires or light
- sockets.
- Use only extension cords that are approved for outdoor use. These cords must meet rigorous safety standards that indoor cords may not meet.
- Outdoor lights, inflatables and other decorations should be plugged into outlets protected by ground fault interrupters.
- Place outdoor lights on a timer or turn them off before you go to bed.



Holiday Lighting Safety Reminder Tips

The holiday season is the most popular time for home decoration. Here are some tips for your holiday lighting displays to help you and your family remain safe.



Indoor Lighting Safety

- * Inspect all light strings and cords for any damage, including frayed wires or insulation that has pulled away from light sockets or plugs. Also check for chewing or scratching damage if you have pets in the house. Discard and replace any damaged light strings.
- * Live trees should be kept well-watered.
- No more than three strings of standard indoor lights should be connected to any extension cord.
- * Make sure cords are placed where they won't be stepped on, kinked or pose a tripping hazard.
- Lights should not be permitted to touch drapes, furniture or carpeting.
- Lights should be turned off overnight and when no one is home.

THE WANTAGE TOWNSHIP OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT SAYS: PLAN AHEAD!!

Where will your family be if a disaster strikes? They could be anywhere-at work, at school, at home or in the car. How will you find each other? Will you know if your children are safe? Disaster may force you to evacuate your neighborhood or confine you to your home. What would you do if basic services- water, gas, electricity or telephones were cut off? Families should be prepared for all hazards that could affect them.

A Disaster Supply Kit should include: a 3-day supply of water (one gallon per person a day) and food that wont spoil, a manual can opener, one change of clothing and footwear per person, one blanket or sleeping bag per person, hand sanitizer, a first aid kit, prescription medicines and emergency tools. An extra set of car keys, credit card and cash. Remember to include any special items needed for infants, elderly or disabled family members.

FOLLOW THESE BASIC STEPS TO DEVELOP A FAMILY DISASTER PLAN

Gather information about hazards. Contact your National Weather Service office www.noaa.gov, emergency management office 973-875-7192 and Sussex County American Red Cross 973-579-1600. Find out what type of disaster could occur and how you should respond. Learn warning signals and evacuation plans.

Meet with your family to create a plan. Discuss information you have gathered. Pick two places to meet in case of emergency: a spot outside your home, in event of an emergency such as a fire, and a place away from your neighborhood in case you can't return home. Choose an out of state friend or relative as your "family check in contact" for everyone to call if the family gets separated. Discuss what you would do if advised to evacuate.

Implement Your Plan. In case phone lines and cell towers are down write down emergency telephone numbers. Install safety measures in your house, such as smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Inspect your home for potential hazards and correct them (items that can move, fall, break, catch fire). Have your family learn basic safety measures, such as CPR and first aid; how to use a fire extinguisher. Teach children how and when to dial 911. Keep enough supplies in your home to meet your needs for at least three days. Keep important family documents in a fire and waterproof container.

WE WORK HARD TO MAKE OUR PARKS A PLACE OF PRIDE. PLEASE COME OUT AND MAKE USE OF YOUR PUBLIC FACILITIES AT OUR PARKS ... BUT PLEASE KEEP IN MIND OUR RULES:

- Pets are welcome at our parks. We ask that you keep them leashed, and PLEASE clean up after them. Receptacles provided for your convenience.
- Our Parks are Carry In /Carry Out, and we do not provide garbage cans. The person /persons who bring things in that need to be discarded must be the ones to carry them back out.
- Fishing is allowed at the Lake Neepaulin beach and Berry Road properties. A Valid fishing license is required. All fishing done within municipal parks is catch and release. Boat fishing is allowed at Lake Neepaulin; not Berry Road pond.
- Our parks are open from dawn until dusk unless for approved team practice or league play.
- Priority is given to organized Township sports and recreation leagues for scheduling the use of field area. Other than that, always remember that the use of park facilities follows the generally accepted rule of "first come, first served." A large group of people looking to play–soccer, football, baseball, lacrosse, etc.— must take place on the field areas and not interfere with the enjoyment of others.

Permits for special events in parks are available under certain circumstances. A person seeking a permit should file an application with the Wantage Township Recreation & Parks Advisory Commission. These applications are available on the web- site: www.wantagetwp.com, or contact us at 973-875-7192 x 243. The proposed use of park must not unreasonably interfere with the general public enjoyment of the park. The proposed activity must not include violence, crime or disorderly conduct, and must not entail extraordinary or burdensome expense of police operation by the State Police. A permit holder shall be bound by all park rules and regulations and all applicable ordinances fully as though the same were stated in the permit. The Wantage Township Recreation & Parks Advisory Commission shall have the authority to revoke a permit upon a finding of violation of any rule, regulation or ordinance, or upon good cause shown.

Our Pavilion is available for rental of a 4-hour peri- od, during which time you are able to have the area exclusive to your party. Pavilion applications are available online:

Picnics/Lunches are fine to have in the park as long as you remember that you cannot exclude the general public from using any area of the park, even during your picnic activities. Please be reasonable and courteous at all times. Our parks are Carry In Carry Out . Please remove all trash, take it with you! Please Do Not throw or place in the water of any pond, lake, or stream, anything that may result in the pollution of such waters. No one may dump or leave any bottles, broken glass, ashes, paper, cans, or trash in the park grounds.

It is against the rules to hunt or trap any animal or bird within a township park, nor are you allowed to disturb its habitat. Shooting into park areas from beyond park boundaries is forbidden. No person may carry firearms of any description.

No one is allowed to mark or deface and public property. You can not dig or remove any soil, rocks, or other materials. No one is allowed to construct any building or structure of any kind. Please do not damage, cut, or remove any tree or plant, or in any other way injure the natural beauty or usefulness of any area of the park.

You cannot drive or park your vehicle anywhere except in the designated parks roads or parking areas. Sorry no overnight camping, No alcoholic beverages, and No Fireworks. Do Not build, or attempt to build, a fire within a municipal park unless a special permit has been obtained from the Township of Wantage for that purpose.

YOUR HOME'S FIRE PREVENTION PLAN



PLAN AHEAD If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

Safety Tips:

Draw a home escape plan and discuss it with everyone in your household.

Practice the plan night and day with everyone in your home twice a year.

Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.

Have a meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.

Push the smoke alarm button to start the practice drill.

Get out Fast practice using different ways out.

Teach children to escape on their own in case you can't help them.

Close doors behind you as you leave.

Go to your outside meeting place. Get out and stay out. Never go back inside for people or pets.

Use your second way out in the case of an actual fire if smoke is blocking your door or the first way out.

Get low and go under the smoke to get out safely if you have to escape through smoke.

Feel the door and knob before opening the door. If they are hot use the second way out.

Consider getting escape ladders listed by a recognized testing laboratory for escaping from a second and third floor windows if all other exits are blocked.

Make sure the ladder fits the window.

To Avoid injury, only use the ladder in a real emergency.

SMOKE DETECTORS SAVE LIVES

Properly working smoke detectors can alert you to a fire in your home, allowing you time to escape, even if you are sleeping. Install smoke detectors on every level of your home including the basement, and in every sleeping area. Test smoke detectors every month, following the manufacturer's directions, and replace the batteries once each year, or whenever a detector "chirps" to signal low battery power. Never "borrow" a smoke detector's battery for another use! A disabled detector cannot save your life! Most importantly, be sure to **replace your smoke detector if it is more than 10 years old.**

Property Taxes Due May 1st

There is a ten-day grace period during which no interest is due. If payment is not received within the first ten days of the due date, interest is due from the first day, at the rate of 8% per annum on the first \$1500.00 and 18% annum on any amount over \$1500.00

Animal Control Information

BEARS: Reports of black bears and people coming into contact with each other have been increasing in recent years. Proper sanitation techniques have proven effective in preventing black bear nuisance problems around homes. Proper storage of residential garbage is the best method for prevention of nuisance problems. Store garbage in airtight containers, in a secure area; do not store garbage cans against doors to the garage or basement, or in a wooden shed. Wash garbage containers at least once a week with a disinfectant solution to remove odors. The outside feeding of dogs and cats should be done during daylight hours. All uneaten food and scraps, as well as the food bowl, should be removed immediately after feeding your pets. Birdfeeders should be suspend- ed from a free hanging wire so that the bottom of the feeder is at least 8 feet off the ground. Feeders should be hung in

daylight hours only. Black bears learn very quickly. Bears that associate food with people may become aggressive. DO NOT FEED BEARS! If you are experiencing nuisance or damage problems related to bears, please contact the NJ Division of Fish, Game and Wildlife's Control Unit at (908) 735-8793. Please remember that the mere presence of a black bear does not represent a problem. Sightings may be reported to the Division's Wildlife Research Unit at (908) 735-7040.







DOGS: Dog Licenses are due by January 31st of every calendar year. If your dog has been spayed or neutered, the dog license fee is \$10.00. If your dog has not been spayed or neutered, the dog license fee is \$14.00. Late fees of \$2 per month, per dog, apply if you have not renewed your dog license before February 1. Please make checks payable to Wantage Township. You must include proof of rabies vaccination. If your dog has been spayed or neutered, you must also include this proof with your application.

If your dog's rabies shot expires before November 1, you must get your dog a new rabies shot before we can process your dog license.

You may obtain your dog license either by mail or in person at the Wantage Township Municipal Building, 888 State Highway 23, Wantage, NJ 07461.

There is a drop-off box located on the right side of the front entrance to the Wantage Municipal Building.

Rabies clinics are held at the Township in the Fall.
